

GSL Report

It's been a great year for the group over all. Autumn included fire lighting skills, team games nights, space and science sessions. Spring bought qigong, a visit from LANSAR to talk about water safety, pancakes and working on disability awareness. In the summer we visited Eggcup, did some pioneering, some sewing and learnt about Beavers around the world.

Cub Scout Report 2022-2023

Over the last 12 months the numbers of cubs in the pack have remained between 18-25 children. Several cubs have left the pack to move on up to scouts and there are several new cubs who have moved up from the beaver section too. In September and October 2022, we started the scouting year by testing out our new air rifle shooting range, we completed activities all about dinosaurs, we held a Halloween and bonfire party, made poppies for Remembrance Day, we had a night on chocolate and finished the year with a Christmas party.

In January and February 2023, we looked at safety with the cubs completing their home safety and personal safety badges. We celebrated Chinese New Year and held an international night and also made pancakes. We built an obstacle course, tried ballista building, has a go at fire-lighting and held a challenge night. These were just some of the activities we completed before Easter.

After Easter we took the opportunity to get outside, found out about St George, celebrated the King's coronation by making crowns and cakes, completed the athletics badge, had a go on the orienteering course in the village and tried out some new outdoor games. We had an evening looking at tents, played some water games, looked at maps and navigation, had a challenge night and looked at our left side before completing the year with a joint party with the beaver section. Throughout the last 12 months the cubs have done various joint activities with one or more of the other sections in the group. These have included a Night at the Museum sleepover with the beavers in October, a group Halloween and bonfire party, taking part with the scout group in Remembrance Sunday and planting some young trees along the path behind the new Storey houses with the beavers. In December the cubs attended the district Santa sleepover at Our Ladies Catholic College with several other cub packs and also went tubing at Kendal Snowsports club in January 2023 with the beavers.

In April the District camp was cancelled, so the beavers, cubs and scouts in the group still went camping to Littledale instead and had a fantastic weekend despite the thunder, lightning and heavy rain showers that got all the cubs soaking wet. All the children coped very well with the changeable weather conditions and everyone had a great time. Just about all the children in the group attended the camp and enjoyed a fun-packed weekend full of activities. Many thanks to the leaders and parents who helped out on the camp to make it a great weekend. Maintenance Report

It's not been as busy a year as the previous in terms of maintenance, but still some important and long benefiting jobs completed, the main items being the:

- Replacement of flooring in both of the toilets and cloakrooms as the tiles
 were starting to lift, this has been a major improvement and not only
 improves the safety but also makes the toilets and cloakrooms feel brighter
 and cleaner. In doing this, all 4 toilets were removed to allow the flooring to
 be laid and at the same time came a great opportunity to paint the walls.
- Replacement of lighting in stores, toilets and kitchen which were aging and beginning to fail and flicker. This was completed around March time and has made the spaces brighter and also saving on electricity.

As always there are always still lots of jobs to do, but this list is getting smaller and is mainly now cosmetic. The main item of concern now however is the drains from the hut to the septic tank/pit which are believed to be sunken and collapsed and repeatedly blocking up. Any knowledge on this area would be greatly appreciated. We also have a quote to replace the flooring in the kitchen and store rooms which is lifting and looking very tired at 40+ years old and we will be looking for funding and fundraising to go towards this in the future.

At some point we will likely look to have a maintenance day/weekend where we can hopefully clear some more of the list, we didn't get around to organising something this last year, but it would likely sometime around easter 2024 as the weather improves. If you are willing to lend a hand at any time, be it cleaning now and again or doing some maintenance let me know, help is greatly appreciated. Finally, we welcome the use of the building by the local community and if you are looking for a space to use for an event or group activity, birthday party or anything else, speak to one of the leaders, all we ask is a fairly small fee to essentially cover the running costs.
